

Co-Pay Cards For Discounts On Diabetes Medications

What is a co pay card and how do I get one?

A copay card, also known as a copay assistance card, is a coupon offered by the drug manufacturer. It saves you money right away at the pharmacy when you pick up your prescription. Sometimes the doctor will have the card available when you are given the prescription. Other times you must go to the drug's official website to apply for the card. Only cards from the official website of that drug will work with your insurance copay. Any discount card from another website can not be used at the same time as your insurance. Bring the card to the pharmacy either when you drop off the prescription or when you pick it up.

Why do I need a copay card?

Some medications are available as brands only, there is no generic available. Your copay on these medications can be quite high. The copay cards are there to save you money and to help make sure you can afford the medication you need.

How often can I use a copay card? Are there any limits?

Most copay cards will let you use them once a month. They will tell you right on the card or website how many times you can use it. Usually copay cards are good for 1 year, then you can go back to the website and renew it for another year. Some cards have a lifetime maximum benefit. At that point, if the drug is not affordable, talk to your doctor to see if there is a less-expensive medication you could try.

If I have questions about a specific copay card who do I ask?
